On November 29, a delegation from CLEM, LMLSG, SAWS and other concerned stakeholders visited the legislature to be seen and heard. We were introduced in the gallery, a petition was read, and MLA Erika Ritchie introduced Bill 615 - The

Comprehensive Wetlands Conservation Act for its first reading. In the coming months we look forward to the debate of this Bill and will keep you posted.

The Bill if passed into law will establish an evidenced based, scientifically defensible, overarching, and cohesive policy and management framework for wetland stewardship and conservation. We need wetlands more than ever as drought continues to threaten our environment and our economy. In the last 3 years Saskatchewan Crop Insurance has paid almost \$6 billion in drought payments! In Alberta Bow River stream flows are at a record low and there is historic glacial melt recorded in Rockies. "These rivers enter Lake Diefenbaker which, in Saskatchewan, provide water for over 60 per cent of the province's population," said Dr. John Pomeroy. "It is now three metres below normal."
